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MACA MEMBERS HELP DURING COVID-19

Who would have ever thought there would be a stay-at-home order in the United States? What about students finishing the rest of the school or college year on-line? What about having business classification as essential? On March 19, 2020, The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) issued guidance on the critical industry workforce that should continue as the country addresses and responds to the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak. U.S. food and agriculture was included among 16 critical industries. This designation covered farmers, as well as employees of companies engaged in the production of chemicals, medicines, vaccines, and other substances used by the food and agriculture industry, including pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, minerals, enrichments, and other agricultural production aids.

Once again, the agriculture community has stepped up. In a recent request to MACA member companies about their efforts to assist in this unprecedented time, several shared their efforts. This is not a complete list of all the member efforts, but a small sample of what has been done to help the country and illustrates the Midwest role.

FMC - Donations of more than 230,000 personal protective equipment supplies, including N95 masks, surgical masks, protective cover suits, and goggles were distributed to hospitals, emergency responders, local emergency management agencies and other entities around the world. The company has also donated supplies to assist with disinfecting schools and other public spaces.

FMC employees have also joined the effort, supporting their local communities in the fight against COVID-19. Many local actions have focused on aiding hunger relief organizations or donating meals to first responders.

Specifically, in MACA's area - FMC's Wyoming, Illinois site donated to local restaurants in support of their efforts to provide kids with school lunches and deliver meals to first responders and those in need. They also partnered with a local food bank to ensure it has adequate resources to meet the needs of the community.

CNI - The headquarter's office is located in Southwest Georgia, a hotspot for COVID-19. The local hospital, Phoebe Putney, has tested and cared for 100's of patients with the disease. CNI provided 100 meals to hospital employees to show their appreciation to those on the front lines for helping combat this disease within the community.

Corteva Agriscience - R&D scientists developed a commercial-grade hand-sanitizer solution in-house, keeping commercial sanitizer in the hands of health care providers and frontline responders where it's needed most. Sanitizer is currently being manufactured at the Corteva Indianapolis and Drusenheim facilities. The Johnston and Indianapolis Corteva teams are using 3D printers to create medical bands to hold elastic straps of face masks behind the head, relieving pressure on the ears. Already more than 1,000 have been created.

GROWMARK/FS - Teamed up with the Illinois Corn Marketing Board and Illinois Soybean Association Checkoff Program to help distribute free hand sanitizer to ag retailers to keep essential agriculture employees and customers safe and healthy.

Nutrien Ag Solutions - Private label Loveland is making a hand sanitizer in various sizes. They allocated \$1 million to support local food solutions in the communities where they live and operate. Their COVID-19 community support plan also includes increased volunteer support, virtual youth education and in-kind donations that can assist the healthcare system.

UPL - The focus for Kingstree, South Carolina, was PPE as they supplied 100 pair of safety glasses to the Sheriff's department, 200 disposable Tyvek suits, 1,000 pair of disposable gloves to County Environmental teams for hospitals and areas of greatest need, 100 gallons of hand sanitizer for county hospitals and offices, and masks are being sewn and donated to the Minnesota Nurses organization and State of Minnesota. They provided food packets to children and those in need along with donations to Cedarville University to provide assistance to international students unable to return to USA.

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Valent USA - Donated to the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano Counties to provide emergency food and also to the new Farmer Relief fund established by the American Farmland Trust for distribution to needy farmers and ranchers. They also donated 170 (N95) respirators and 50 procedure masks to John Muir Medical Center in Walnut Creek. Lastly, labs in Dublin and Libertyville, CA, are making hand sanitizer for manufacturing teams who are not able to work from home.

Gowan - Supported the Arizona Community Foundation by matching the donations dollar-for-dollar. Donations assist nonprofits in the areas of food, housing, utilities, transportation, childcare, education, and health services.

BASF - Joined COVID-19 hunger relief efforts with a \$170,000 donation to Feeding America. The company's North America Agricultural Solutions employees in the U.S. hosted a virtual food drive in March and April to support Feeding America food banks across the country by making financial contributions online. BASF matched donations dollar-for-dollar, including the BASF match, will be donated to Feeding America member food banks based on donor zip codes. BASF donated an additional \$195,000 to Feeding America. The gift includes a \$150,000 corporate donation and \$45,000 from BASF's largest facilities in Michigan, Texas, and Louisiana. Thus, a total contribution of more than \$365,000 to Feeding America was made.

Bayer - Provided a donation of one million products to support the health of underserved communities. The products, including over-the-counter medications and multivitamins, will be delivered directly to Americans who can't easily access them by way of partnerships with Direct Relief and, in subsequent weeks, Feeding America.

Syngenta Crop Protection - Teams at US production sites worked with local organizations to help meet the escalating needs of the health-care community. In Omaha, Nebraska, the company provided containers and the employees donated their time so that more than 2,000 gallons of hand sanitizer were packaged and sent to hospitals, first responders, and others during the pandemic. At the Nampa, Idaho site, they supported the 'Crush The Curve Idaho' Initiative by donating 6,000 nitrile gloves plus 80 N95 face masks. Syngenta also created a Customer/External Wellbeing Portal to help customers, communities, and other external partners with useful resources. To help combat food insecurity in local communities with Syngenta sites, the leadership teams in North America approved donations to area food banks in Greensboro, RTP, and Baton Rouge, plus made hand sanitizer at Greensboro and Omaha.

This year will go down in history for many reasons - the COVID-19 pandemic, how people chose to work together and joined forced to support the vital efforts of those who continue to provide the essential goods and services we need to live. MACA is proud of the varied contributions made by the members, those referenced in this article, as well as those who made contributions but chose to remain anonymous.

PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE 2020-UNPRECEDENTED TIMES!

MACA membership value and benefits. This is one of the most common questions asked. I appointed a task force to identify the benefits and then determine a value for them. What would happen if MACA just

It was very productive as it made us identify the reasons that companies become a member and we assigned an estimated value to each should the company need to get the information from some other source. As a result, we realized the benefits are well worth 10 times the cost of membership. A nice return on investment! Also, a summary of benefits was created and emailed to every company contact. Dues restructuring. After working on the budget last fall, the board of directors realized expenses were exceeding income and while there is a reserve, we thought it prudent to get to a balanced budget. The task force reviewed the entire budget to determine cost cuts and possible increases to income. With the mergers and acquisitions taking place, fewer companies mean less income from dues. After much discussion, the board approved restructuring the dues to be more reflective of the

company's size and sales volume in April, effective for the 2021 membership year, and the information was emailed to the company contacts. The Board will continue to work to recruit new members as well explore other ways to increase income yet deliver member value. The board works hard to make sure they are not duplicating efforts of any other association.

Annual Meeting. This will be a great opportunity to bring the industry together! The planning committee has compiled an excellent list of speakers focusing on "Vision 2030." While we are planning for people to be in St. Louis, in these uncertain times, know that we are exploring other ways to hold the meeting and be mindful of the current health risks.
